Annual Parish Council Meeting – Wednesday 22nd May 6.30pm followed by the Annual Parish Meeting – 7.30pm – 8.30pm – All Saint's Church

The **Annual Parish Council Meeting** elects the Parish Council Chair for the forthcoming year. This is followed by the usual PC business. All are very welcome to attend this meeting (as is the case with all meetings of the Parish Council) and there is always the opportunity for you to ask questions and express concerns to Councillors.

This will be followed by the **Annual Parish Meeting**. This meeting predates Parish Councils and is a whole village event. Everyone in Thornage and Little Thornage is invited to come along. It is the annual opportunity for all the residents to meet and talk about what has happened locally over the previous year and to plan for the year ahead. This year there will be a report by Nigel Watchorn on **the Common** and its relevance to the Biodiversity legislation and proposals moving forward.

The **Annual Parish Meeting** starts at 7.30pm. There will be short updates from local groups and biodiversity plans for Thornage Common followed by an Open Forum for questions and comments. This will be followed by light refreshments provided by Friends of Thornage.

<u>Biodiversity in the Parish – Draft Action Plan</u> (copies on website and Noticeboard)

This considers how the Parish Council can influence District and County Councils and also what residents can do on their own properties. You might like to consider these for your gardens:

- reduced Spring mowing during the last half of May and early June and leave some unmown grass until September to encourage insects and birds.
- avoid cutting hedges in nesting season (March-August).
- leave log piles and hedge cuttings (to encourage hedgehogs & toads)
- plant bee-friendly and indigenous trees (particularly those with berries) and flowers
- bird and bat boxes in suitable locations, and hedgehog highways between gardens
- consider making a natural pond with ledges for creatures to climb in & out, and to sunbathe.
- Leave piles of stones, much loved by newts, toads & frogs the damper the better
- Identify & reduce sources of light pollution due to their impact on the nocturnal natural habitat

Highways News

B1110 Holt bridge - Parish Councillors note that the bridge appears safer with increased visibility due to the reduced height of the hedges and have passed their views onto NCC Highways.

Hunworth Footbridge – photos of the latest condition of the footbridge have been sent to NCC Highways and the local County Councillor.

SAM2 Speed Monitor - A site has been agreed with NCC Highways for the SAM2 in Little Thornage. Locations will be discussed further at the next meeting.
